

HOW ARE WE TODAY?



When Deacon Steven asks at the beginning of his homilies, "How are my people of St. Ann?" his expectation and the tradition that we have started when we hear this question is that we are blessed. When we feel blessings everywhere, we are always happy people of God because we can always see the Lord's hands in our lives. Today's Gospel is all about being blessed. Some versions of the Bible use the expression "happy are those"....If we, therefore, replace the word "blessed" with "happy" in the expressions "Blessed are you poor," "Blessed are you that hunger," "Blessed are you that weep," "Blessed are you when men hate you, and when they exclude you and revile you, and cast out your name as evil," we can then ask the

questions: How can one be happy who is poor? How can one be satisfied when they are hungry? How can one maintain happiness while weeping? How can one rejoice when rejected, hated, or cast out? The beatitudes must have a deeper meaning than the standard human language. Finding happiness and hope in our suffering is what it's all about.

Getting it straight, good health is preferred to sickness, joy is more acceptable than sorrow, success is more interesting than failure, riches are more cherished than poverty, and we can continue the thesis and antithesis. The reality in our lives is that to suffer is not welcome or sweet. A life of faith is constantly challenged in moments of suffering or pain, and we must remain close to the Lord and join our miseries to the cross of Jesus if we want to receive the fruits of salvation. This is especially true in circumstances in which we don't want to live or when we feel abandoned. These are times in which only our comfort comes from God. But it is absolute comfort and relief because in and with God, we have a true refuge that elevates our human-limited condition to a superior dimension that brings us a lot of hope and peace. Learning to wait and place everything in the hands of the Lord makes us feel truly blessed.



We want to remind all those who wish to participate in the remodeling of the Fr. Anderson Building with the "Make Our Legacy New" campaign of the following important instructions:

- 1. If you received a pledge envelope, it is important to remember that the immediate objective is to collect personal information such as: Name, Address, and Phone Number.
- 2. With this information given, you will be counted as one of the donors the campaign requires for the next three years. It is vitally important that this information is on the envelope.
- 3. It is also important to remember that while pledge payment collection will begin on January 1, 2025, we need the envelope with your information as soon as possible.
- 4. We have learned that many people wish to make a single payment for the total three-year commitment of \$3,120. This option reduces handling and paperwork costs.



SAINT OF THE WEEK: PETER DAMIAN

Maybe because he was orphaned and had been treated shabbily by one of his brothers, Peter Damian was very good to the poor. It was ordinary for him to have a poor person or two with him at the table, and he liked to minister personally to their needs.

Peter escaped poverty and the neglect of his brother when his other brother, Ravenna's archpriest, took him under his wing. His brother sent him to good schools, and Peter became a professor.

Already in those days, Peter was very strict with himself. He wore a hair shirt under his clothes, fasted rigorously, and prayed for many hours. Soon, he decided to leave his teaching and give himself to prayer with the Benedictines for the reform of St. Romuald at Fonte Avellana. They lived two monks in a hermitage. Peter was so eager to pray and slept so little that he soon suffered from severe insomnia. He found he had to use some prudence in taking care of himself. When he was not praying, he studied the Bible.

The abbot commanded that when he died, Peter should succeed him. Abbot Peter founded five other hermitages. He encouraged his brothers in a life of prayer and solitude and wanted nothing more for himself. The Holy See periodically called on him to be a peacemaker or troubleshooter between two abbeys in dispute or a cleric or government official in disagreement with Rome.

Finally, Pope Stephen IX made Peter the cardinal-bishop of Ostia. He worked hard to wipe out simony—buying church offices—and encouraged his priests to observe celibacy. He also urged the diocesan clergy to live together and maintain scheduled prayer and religious observance. He wished to restore primitive discipline among religious and priests, warning against needless travel, violations of poverty, and too comfortable living. He even wrote to the bishop of Besancon complaining that the canons there sat down when they sang the psalms in the Divine Office.

He wrote many letters. Some 170 are extant. We also have 53 of his sermons and seven lives, or biographies, that he wrote. He preferred examples and stories rather than theory in his writings. The liturgical offices he wrote are evidence of his talent as a stylist in Latin.

He often asked to be allowed to retire as cardinal-bishop of Ostia, and finally, Pope Alexander II consented. Peter was happy to become a monk once again, but he was still called to serve as a papal legate. When returning from such an assignment in Ravenna, he was overcome by a fever. With the monks gathered around him saying the Divine Office, he died on February 22, 1072. In 1828, he was declared a Doctor of the Church.

Reflection: Peter was a reformer, and if he were alive today, he would no doubt encourage the renewal started by Vatican II. He would also applaud the greater emphasis on prayer shown by the growing number of priests, religious, and laypersons who gather regularly for prayer, as well as the special houses of prayer recently established by many religious communities.

¿CÓMO ESTAMOS HOY?



Cuando el diácono Steven pregunta al comienzo de sus homilías: "¿Cómo está mi pueblo de Santa Ana?", su expectativa y la tradición que hemos iniciado cuando escuchamos esta pregunta es que somos bendecidos. Cuando sentimos bendiciones en todas partes, siempre somos felices como pueblo de Dios porque siempre podemos ver las manos del Señor en nuestras vidas. El Evangelio de hoy trata de ser bendecidos. Algunas versiones de la Biblia usan la expresión "felices los que"... Si, por lo tanto, reemplazamos la palabra "benditos" por "felices" en las expresiones "Bienaventurados los pobres", "Bienaventurados los que tienen hambre", "Bienaventurados los

que lloran", "Bienaventurados los que os odien, os excluyan, os injurien y proscriban vuestro nombre como malo", entonces podemos hacer las preguntas: ¿Cómo puede ser feliz un pobre? ¿Cómo puede uno estar satisfecho cuando tiene hambre? ¿Cómo puede uno mantener la felicidad mientras llora? ¿Cómo puede uno regocijarse cuando es rechazado, odiado o expulsado? Las bienaventuranzas deben tener un significado más profundo que el lenguaje humano estándar. De lo que se trata es de encontrar felicidad y esperanza en nuestro sufrimiento.

Entendámoslo bien, la salud es preferible a la enfermedad, la alegría es más aceptable que la tristeza, el éxito es más interesante que el fracaso, las riquezas son más apreciadas que la pobreza, y podemos continuar con la tesis y la antítesis. La realidad en nuestras vidas es que sufrir no es bienvenido ni dulce. Una vida de fe se ve constantemente desafiada en momentos de sufrimiento o dolor, y debemos permanecer cerca del Señor y unir nuestras miserias a la cruz de Jesús si queremos recibir los frutos de la salvación. Esto es especialmente cierto en circunstancias en las que no queremos vivir o cuando nos sentimos abandonados. Son momentos en los que nuestro consuelo sólo viene de Dios. Pero es un consuelo y alivio absoluto porque en y con Dios, tenemos un verdadero refugio que eleva nuestra condición humanamente limitada a una dimensión superior que nos trae mucha esperanza y paz. Aprender a esperar y poner todo en manos del Señor nos hace sentir verdaderamente bienaventurados.


