

## RAISE YOUR PALMS



With the celebration of Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord, we have arrived at the last Sunday of Lent. On this day, the Catholic Church celebrates the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem.

At Jesus' time, Israel was governed by the Romans. Jesus' disciples were convinced that Jesus was a political messiah who would lead a rebellion against the Roman colonial rule and drive out the Romans. Therefore, on arriving in Jerusalem to celebrate the Passover, he was welcomed as a king: "The very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, while others cut branches from the trees and strewed them on the road. The crowds preceding him and those following kept crying out and saying: 'Hosanna to the Son of David; blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord; Hosanna in the highest'" (Matthew 21:8-9). In Hebrew, 'hosanna' means 'save us now.' So, the people were crying, "Save us now, Son of David; you are sent by the Lord; it's high time you save us." Like the crowds, we cry to Jesus to save us from our afflictions.

Jesus entered Jerusalem riding a colt (a young donkey). Jesus chose to enter Jerusalem on a donkey, which was, at that time, the means of transportation for the poor, instead of a horse, which was the means of transportation for the rich, the high, and the mighty. By riding a donkey, Jesus made himself our 'beast of burden,' fulfilling Isaiah 53:54, "He took up our pain and bore our suffering." Like the donkey, Jesus carries our pains and sufferings. By riding a donkey, Jesus identified himself with the poor and the lowly and taught us to do the same. He wants us to identify with the burdened, the needy, the sick, and the suffering. And by riding a donkey, Jesus teaches us the importance of detachment and humility. In Matthew 11:29, Jesus says, "Learn from me for I am gentle and humble in heart."

Today's celebration becomes even more meaningful if Jesus makes a triumphal entry into our lives, granting us peace, victory over evil, salvation, and eternal life. Let us not stop Jesus' entry into our lives by our sins. Jesus says, "Behold, I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, then I will enter his house and dine with him, and he with me" (Revelations 3:20).

In some cultures, carrying or presenting palm leaves is a gesture of peace and reconciliation in times of crisis or misunderstanding. Today, the Church gives us palm leaves, a symbol of peace and reconciliation, to take to our homes and places. Let us share the message of peace and reconciliation while Jesus passes in our midst.

Blessed is the King who comes in the name of the Lord—peace in heaven and glory in the highest.

## RECEPTION OF THE HOLY OILS



The reception of the Holy Oils: Oil of the Sick, Oil of Catechumens, and the Holy Chrism, which Bishop John Noonan blesses during the Chrism Mass, will be presented by our Deacons to Fr. Alfonso and our congregation before the Mass of the Last Supper of the Lord.

The oils will be reserved in a suitable repository in the presbytery or near the baptismal font.

## THE PLACE OF REPOSE (HOLY THURSDAY)

A procession is formed in which the Blessed Sacrament, accompanied by torches and incense, is carried through the church to a place of repose prepared in a part of the church or chapel suitably decorated.

**The faithful are invited to continue adoration before the Blessed Sacrament for a suitable length of time during the night, according to local circumstances. After Midnight, the adoration should take place without solemnity.**

## EASTER VIGIL MASS

The rubrics of the Roman Missal remind us that this “mother of all vigils” is the “greatest and most noble of all solemnities, and it is to be unique in every single Church.” On this holy night, the Church keeps watch, celebrating the resurrection of Christ in the sacraments and awaiting his return in glory. It is the turning point of the Triduum, the Passover of the new covenant, which marks Christ’s passage from death to life.

We invite everyone to join us for this special celebration. As a reminder, there will be:

**no 4:00 PM Mass on  
Holy Saturday (April 19).**

Instead, we will celebrate the Easter Vigil Mass (April 19) at 8:00 PM (Bilingual).



## WASHING OF THE FEET (HOLY THURSDAY)



In this sacred celebration of the Last Supper of the Lord, the principal mysteries commemorated in this Mass are the institution of the Holy Eucharist, the Priestly Order, and the commandment of Love.

**As a reminder, according to the ancient tradition of the Catholic Church, the only Mass that can be celebrated on this day is “The Lord’s Supper.”**

## SUNRISE MASS

In the Gospel narrative, **Jesus rises from the dead early on Sunday morning.** There is no mention of the exact time when Jesus rose, but he had already left the tomb by the time some of his disciples came there.

St. John narrates: “On the first day of the week, Mary Magdalene went to the tomb early in the morning while it was still dark, and she saw the stone rolled away from the tomb. Peter and the other disciple went to the tomb. The two ran together, but the other disciple ran ahead faster than Peter and reached the tomb first. He bent down and saw the bandages on the ground” (John 20).

The symbolism of this tradition is very clear, as it **celebrates the rising of the Son**, the true **Light of the World**, at the moment when the rays of the sun begin to shatter the darkness of night.

## WHY IS THERE NO MASS & ONLY A "SERVICE" ON GOOD FRIDAY?



One of the most fascinating days in the liturgical calendar is Good Friday. On the day that honors the Passion and death of Jesus, the Church abstains from offering a Mass.

### No Mass

Instead, the Church instructs its believers to host a "Celebration of the Lord's Passion," which includes a special reading of the Gospel, the veneration of the cross, and the distribution of Holy Communion from the reserved Sacrament.

St. Thomas Aquinas offers in his *Summa Theologica* one explanation as to why the Mass is not offered. He states, "The figure [the Mass] ceases on the advent of the reality. But this sacrament is a figure and a representation of our Lord's Passion, as stated above. And therefore, on the day our Lord's Passion is recalled as it was really accomplished, this sacrament is not consecrated."

In this way, we remember the reality of Jesus' Passion, without celebrating the "figure" or "representation."

Furthermore, the absence of the consecration of the bread and wine highlight the sorrow of Good Friday, as the Catholic News Agency points out.

**The omission of the prayer of consecration deepens our sense of loss because Mass throughout the year reminds us of the Lord's triumph over death, the source of our joy and blessing. The desolate quality of the rites of this day reminds us of Christ's humiliation and suffering during his Passion.**

The St. Andrew Daily Missal echoes what has already been written, explaining how "Good Friday is the anniversary of our Lord's death. On this day, when on Calvary the bloodstained throne of the cross stands out before the world, the Church, bowed low in adoration before Him who reigns from the Cross, does not celebrate the sacrifice of the Mass; following an ancient practice, once widespread, she contents herself with receiving the sacred species consecrated yesterday."

Alternatively, some historians claim that the Good Friday liturgy "represents, according to Duchesne (234), 'the exact order of the ancient synaxes without a liturgy,' i.e., the order of the earliest Christian prayer meetings, at which, however, the liturgy proper, i.e., the Mass, was not celebrated. **This kind of meeting for worship was derived from the Jewish Synagogue service, and consisted of lessons, chants, and prayers.**" In this way, we participate in a liturgy that **resembles a prayer service that was celebrated by the early Christians.**

Above all things, Good Friday is meant to be a day of mourning and sadness, feeling the weight of our sins that were placed on the back of Jesus Christ. **The absence of a Mass highlights this feeling and better prepares us for the glories that await us on Easter.**

It is a strange day in the calendar of the Church, but one that is designed to prepare our hearts

## LEVANTEN LAS PALMAS



Con la celebración del Domingo de Ramos de la Pasión del Señor, llegamos al último domingo de Cuaresma. En este día, la Iglesia Católica celebra la entrada triunfal de Jesús a Jerusalén.

En tiempos de Jesús, Israel estaba gobernado por los romanos. Sus discípulos estaban convencidos de que Jesús era un mesías político que lideraría una rebelión contra el dominio colonial romano y expulsaría a los romanos. Por lo tanto, al llegar a Jerusalén para celebrar la Pascua, fue recibido como un rey: «La multitud, muy numerosa, tendía sus mantos en el camino; otros cortaban ramas de los árboles y las esparcían por el camino. La multitud que lo precedía y la que lo seguía gritaban: “¡Hosanna al Hijo de David! ¡Bendito el que viene en el nombre del Señor! ¡Hosanna en las alturas!”» (Mateo 21:8-9). En hebreo, «hosanna» significa «sálvanos ahora». Así que la gente clamaba: «¡Sálvanos ahora, Hijo de David! Eres enviado por el Señor; ya es hora de que nos salves». Al igual que las multitudes, clamamos a Jesús para que nos salve de nuestras aflicciones.

Jesús entró en Jerusalén montado en un burro. Jesús eligió entrar en Jerusalén montado en un burro, que en aquel entonces era el medio de transporte de los pobres, en lugar de un caballo, que era el medio de transporte de los ricos, los encumbrados y los poderosos. Al montar un burro, Jesús se convirtió en nuestra «bestia de carga», cumpliendo Isaías 53:54: «Él cargó con nuestros dolores y soportó nuestros sufrimientos». Al igual que el burro, Jesús carga con nuestros dolores y sufrimientos. Al montar un burro, Jesús se identificó con los pobres y los humildes y nos enseñó a hacer lo mismo. Quiere que nos identifiquemos con los agobiados, los necesitados, los enfermos y los que sufren. Y al montar un burro, Jesús nos enseña la importancia del desprendimiento y la humildad. En Mateo 11:29, Jesús dice: «Aprendan de mí, que soy manso y humilde de corazón».

La celebración de hoy cobra aún más significado si Jesús entra triunfalmente en nuestras vidas, concediéndonos paz, victoria sobre el mal, salvación y vida eterna. No impidamos que Jesús entre en nuestras vidas por nuestros pecados. Jesús dice: «He aquí, yo estoy a la puerta y llamo. Si alguno oye mi voz y abre la puerta, entrará en su casa y cenará con él, y él conmigo» (Apocalipsis 3:20).

En algunas culturas, llevar o presentar hojas de palma es un gesto de paz y reconciliación en tiempos de crisis o malentendidos. Hoy, la Iglesia nos regala hojas de palma, símbolo de paz y reconciliación, para llevar a nuestros hogares y lugares. Compartamos el mensaje de paz y reconciliación mientras Jesús pasa entre nosotros.

Bendito el Rey que viene en el nombre del Señor. Paz en el cielo y gloria en las alturas.



## MISA DEL ALBA

En la narración del Evangelio, Jesús resucita de entre los muertos el domingo por la mañana temprano. No se menciona la hora exacta en que Jesús resucitó, pero ya había salido de la tumba cuando algunos de sus discípulos llegaron allí.

San Juan narra: "El primer día de la semana va María Magdalena de madrugada al sepulcro cuando todavía estaba oscuro, y ve la piedra quitada del sepulcro. Pedro y el otro discípulo, se encaminaron al sepulcro. Corrían los dos juntos, pero el otro discípulo corrió por delante más rápido que Pedro, y llegó primero al sepulcro. Se inclinó y vio las vendas en el suelo" (Juan, 20).

El simbolismo de esta tradición es muy claro, ya que celebra la resurrección del Hijo de Dios, la verdadera Luz del Mundo, en el momento en que los rayos del sol comienzan romper la oscuridad de la noche.
